
Now for the April history lesson;

Pony Express mail service was created April 3, 1860. This service was for delivering mail, messages and newspapers between Missouri and California. This was accomplished by horse-mounted riders. Those riders were chosen for the speed in which they and their horses could perform. The Pony Express was of a great financial importance to the United States. At this time catalogs were created, allowing the buying and selling between states. It became the most direct means of communication until the

telegraph was established in 1861. The Pony Express however was not a financial success and went bankrupt 18 months later on October 24, 1861 and Western Union telegraph took its place. Western Union is still in operation today providing means to send money both domestically and internationally right from your smart phone with the Western Union app. I can only imagine that being an employee of the Pony Express would have been a dangerous job as far as thieves and robbers along their routes. Also, the weather would have been a challenge.


