Looking to the Future at the Indiana Masonic Home

The Board of Directors of your Indiana Masonic Home at Compass Park continues to plan for the future of our residents and are proud of several new facilities and programs either recently completed or in progress.

The Community Center, completed in 2015, provides a great environment for our residents with a fully staffed fitness center and pool that may be used for exercise classes and lap swimming. There is also casual dining in the Bistro as well as banquet space for up to 300. Eastern Star and Masonic related groups get a discounted rate for rental of the Community Center for events.

In August, the newly renovated Administration Building was opened. The entire interior of this 100-year old heart of the Indiana Masonic Home was completely remodeled and includes new dining room and lobby, several activity spaces for the residents, new library and renovation of Nettie Ransford Chapel. The Chapel will now be able to accommodate Chapter meetings and other functions in addition to regular religious services. There are even overnight hotel rooms for guest of residents to use on overnight visits.

A brand new Skilled Nursing and Rehabilitation Center is now under construction with completion set for late 2018. This new facility will replace the aging Health Center and provide state of the art care for those in need of this level of healthcare. We now also have in-house Home Health Care available to serve our community.

Our residents continue to enjoy a wide range of activities including local outings and entertainments and we have recently constructed a new shelter house on the circle being used for resident and other events.

Your Board of Directors consists of 18 Master Masons including the Grand Master of Masons and other Grand Lodge officers or members appointed by the Grand Master and one representative of Grand Chapter appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron. This dedicated group continues to assure that our current residents are being well served as well as planning for the long-term health of our institution.

Members of the Order of the Eastern Star have been stalwart supporters of the Indiana Masonic Home including financial support of the Worthy Grand Matron's annual project and the Board appreciates this and other ways in which you support our mission.

The Chapter floor had been rearranged from the familiar floor plan to accommodate half the area for the children to spread out on the floor and the other half for adults to be seated. Big screen TV's are no match for viewing this movie on a 10' wide wall. The Polar Express ran for an hour and forty minutes and the children never took their eyes off the action. There was no talking, crying or whining, just total attention to the show. Even the Grinch behaved! What made the movie even more special, for this adult, was looking around the room and

seeing that the children had split the floor in half with all the boys lying down on one side and the girls lying down on the other side. Recalling childhood chants, "boys have cooties and girls are a pest", I had to chuckle!

Masonic History of the Indiana Masonic Home Order of the Eastern Star Records

This is Part 5 of some of the history of our Masonic Home in Eastern Star records. Part 1 was in the January 2017 issue, Part 2 was in the April 2017 issue, Part 3 was in the July 2017 issue, and Part 4 was in the October 2017 issue.

1960 – Project: The Associate Matron of each Chapter in the state of Indiana is to visit the Masonic Home at some time during the year, to give a report of this visit in her Chapter and to forward a copy of the report to the Worthy Grand Matron. Also continue voluntary contributions to the Home. Motion to raise assessment for Masonic Home was defeated.

1961 – Motion was made to raise Grand Chapter Assessment to \$1.30 (\$1.00 for Masonic Home and 30 cents for Grand Chapter). This motion to lay over for one year for enactment or rejection.

1962 – Project: 40 cents voluntary contribution by each member for support of Masonic Home. Motion presented last year to change Constitution and raise per capita dues from 60 cents to \$1.30 was adopted and became law.

1963 – Instead of a boutonniere, many Chapters gave the WGP money which he gave to the Masonic Home for new buffets in the dining room.

1966 – Project: New bedroom furniture for boys and girls cottages at the Masonic Home.

1967 – Project: To lend a helping hand to the Indiana Grand Lodge in its "Ten for Ten" program to be called the "Golden Link Fund" – 40% of gifts to add new additions to the Home Hospital, 40% for operation of Hospital, 20% to go to Masonic Home Foundation for its endowment fund.

1969 - Project: To refurbish the library at Masonic Home and ESTARL.

1970 – Project: New elevator for administrative building at Masonic Home. WGM asked each member of the order to donate at least one book of S & H Green Stamps or Top Value Stamps which will be cashed. Checks will be accepted, too.

1971 – Project: New portable X-ray machine for the Masonic Home and Hospital and ESTARL.

This is the last of the information received for the History of the Masonic Home. We hope you have enjoyed reading some of the interesting comments and thank Keith Maple for all his work in researching and gathering the information so we all could enjoy it. Compiling the history was a great undertaking and it is greatly appreciated. 
Ask Others to Join Eastern Star



I commend you for this splendid accomplishment. I commend, more than all, the spirit with which this donation was made. This Home at Franklin will be a Home in reality mostly because of the assistance and helpfulness of the Eastern Star.

No matter how beautiful you may build the structure, in marble and decorate in gold, it would not be a home without the tender and sympathetic touch of women. Your name, The Eastern Star Hospital, appears over the entrance of the hospital building. You have been busy during the winter months raising funds to furnish it as well as many rooms of the main building.

All praise to the Order of Eastern Star, and your Grand Secretary, Mrs. Ransford, is entitled to the greatest praise shared by all the members of your noble order. Your dreams have come true and from it all we shall soon possess one of the finest Masonic Homes. Let us be truly thankful for all these glorious women. "

This was a touching reading by the Worthy Grand Matron and made everyone stop and think how Sister Nettie could accomplish this in 1916. We all feel this is the reason we have continued this rich tradition all these years. Sister Mary Davis of Oakland Chapter then read a rendition of the life history of a Sister Nettie.
