Seymour Eastern Star Chapter Celebrates 125th Anniversary

A visit to Jackson Masonic Lodge on Saturday, April 21st, was like a time warp back to the year 1893 as Seymour Chapter Order of the Eastern Star celebrated their 125th Anniversary of receiving their Charter on April 26, 1893.

The Lobby of the Lodge was decorated with many antiques owned by members of the Chapter. A Pictorial Timeline of the History of the Order of Eastern Star and Seymour Chapter correlating chronological events in Seymour and around the world was on display along with an antique handmade quilt, crocheted afghans, the first Minute Book of the Chapter, and many other ancient artifacts. Bouquets of daisies in glass jars adorned with crocheted ribbon along with antique crocheted doilies and antiques decorated the dining tables. A complete noon meal reminiscent of an 1893 dinner was catered by the Pines.

Following pictures taken by Stephen Kroman, Photographer for the Grand Lodge F&AM of Indiana, the Holy Bible was placed on the Altar by Denver Gray, Chapter Chaplain. This original Bible from 1893 was signed by all the Past Matrons and Patrons from 1893-1993 when it was retired at the Chapter's 100th Anniversary.
