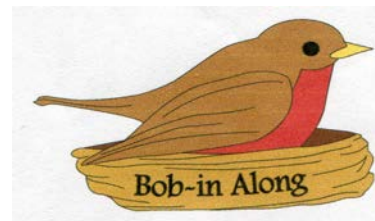

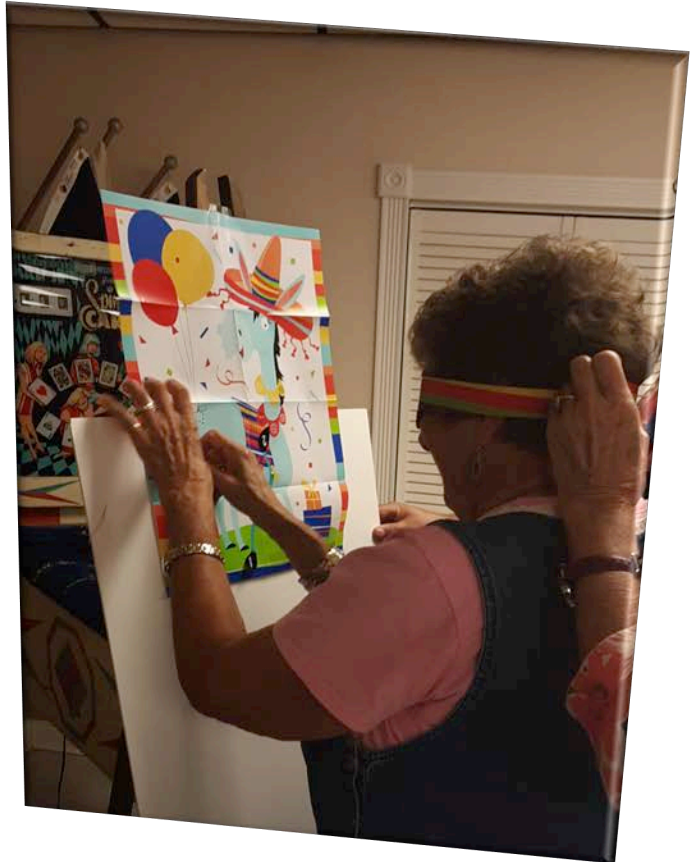
PGM Virgia Hendrick, PGM Shirley Glessner, DD#13 Phyllis Nottingham and Max were introduced and given a hearty welcome.
