

INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION CATEGORIES

<u>Chaplain</u>'s Prayers: This will include all of the following prayers: The Opening prayer on page 42, the Initiation prayer which begins on page 79 and the Closing prayer on page 46.

<u>Associate Conductress</u>' Lecture in the Preparation Room. This includes the part which begins on page 50 of the Ritual.

<u>Conductress</u>' Initiation Lectures. This will include the lecture inside the door beginning on page 53 of the Ritual, the small lectures at each Star Point on pages 60, 64, 67, 70, and 73 and the presentation to the Worthy Patron on page 76 of the Ritual.

<u>Worthy Matron</u>'s Initiation Lectures. This includes the two lectures which begin on pages 56 and 77 of the Ritual.

<u>Associate Patron</u>'s long form Initiation Lecture. This will be the entire lecture which begins on page 86 and concludes on page 90 with instruction to the Conductress.

<u>Worthy Patron</u>'s Lecture. This part begins on page 80 of the Ritual and concludes on page 86 with instruction to the Conductress. We will have a signet to view and a Conductress assisting.

<u>Star Points</u> Initiation Lecture. Select which Star Point you would like to do. We will provide chair, pedestal, emblem and ribbon. You must adapt to setup. (You may, however, choose to bring your own emblem if you desire.) A judge will signal the beginning of the lecture by stating "I present this Sister..." There will be no Conductress or candidate participating.

Worthy Matron's Funeral Ceremony. Includes three parts to be given by the Worthy Matron beginning on pages 153, 156 and 159.

<u>Chaplain</u>'s Prayers in the Funeral Ceremony. This includes the two prayers in the ceremony (pages 154-155 and 159-160).

<u>Star Point</u> tributes in the Funeral Ceremony. This includes ALL five tributes given by the Star Points on pages 157-159.

EXCLUSIONS: Current Grand Officers and Past Grand Matrons/Patrons are excluded. Also, any contestant who won in 2018 may compete again, but MUST choose a different category.

Changing Lives One Dog at a Time

Part 2 (Continued from December)

ICAN is a 501(C)3 non-profit organization whose mission is to train and place assistance dogs with individuals with disabilities and provide foundational life skills to inmates through their experience as trainers.

The Dogs

ICANs dogs in training come from these sources:

- 1. ICAN participates in a national breeding program with other accredited service dogs throughout the United States. Majority of the dogs are Cross Golden - Labrador Retrievers, Labrador Retrievers and Golden Retrievers.
- 2. A limited number of dogs are donated by certified breeders and shelters.

Nationally about 50% to 60% of service dogs in training make it to become a service dog. Being part of a national breeding co-op, ICAN's success rate is around 62%. If the dogs are not going to make it, they may have the skills to become electronic scent dogs (scent detection for child pornography or sex trafficking). If not, they are released to applicants (through an application and home visit process) wishing to adopt a dog from their program. The dog's temperament and health play a big role in their success.

The Handlers

You can find many handlers' stories when you visit the website or read ICAN literature. At the recent visit to IWP Michelle shared her story. She was sentenced for 30 to 60 years in prison and has been in for five years. Prior to being incarcerated she said she was very selfish and self-centered.

Michelle said she realizes people have been hurt and impacted by her bad decisions.

Being in the ICAN program has taught her many things and skills – team building, putting her dog first and taking responsibility for herself and her dog, Sloan who is her first dog to train. She views the program as an opportunity to give back.

A constant theme that runs through most of the inmate's stories is that the handler has learned as much – if not more – than the dogs. They have become calmer, more caring and never believed how drastically a dog could change their life. Just like a service dog can change the life of a client receiving the dog, dogs can positively alter the life of the handler / inmate.

Training

Inmates are carefully chosen to be part of the program. They apply and are interviewed just as they would for a position on the outside. Handler Rheann at IWP said the formal interview 'gives you experience' that will be helpful on re-entry into the community. She said the process says that ICAN values you as a person and that they have expectations that you are expected to meet.

A review process occurs every 90 days and is a feedback so the handler knows what to work on and how to improve.

How can you help?

Terrie and Jerry Barber, State Co-Chairman of the Service Dog Project, offer these suggestions:

Buy one or all of the four different stuffed dogs for sale (\$10 each). Stuffed pink poodles will also soon be available for sale (\$10 each). Buy a doggie charm (\$5 each). There are two different styles. Make a donation of any amount and give to your district chairman. Make your check payable to: Indiana Grand Chapter OES. See your district chairman to buy your puppy or a charm or make a donation anytime during the year.


