
I hope all of you had a joyous Holiday Season


## **Cancer Fund Auction**

Friends were introduced and each was given one of the cutouts of Indiana in ceramic as a gift. Closing prayer was given by Sandra Heath, WM, after thanking all for coming to our Birthday celebration of Indiana's 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary as a State in the United States.
