How to Fit Volunteering into Your Packed Schedule

Choose Your Project Wisely and Set Realistic Expectations

Volunteering is a great way to give back, but can be difficult to do if you're focused on your own stuff. Here are a few ways you can volunteer without disrupting your current lifestyle.

Volunteering is a lot easier if you can <u>find volunteer opportunities</u> that you genuinely enjoy. You'll be much more motivated, and you'll have fun doing it. Set some realistic expectations, too. For example, if you don't have time to help out every week or month, you can still try to make one event or project per season. You might feel like this isn't enough, but remember that even a little bit is still better than not doing it at all. And when your schedule changes, you can easily ramp it up.

Look for volunteer venues that correspond to the time you do have to give. Call ahead and speak to someone about what you can do for them with the time you can spare. You may need to adjust your expectations since some organizations require a minimum number of hours per week or months of guaranteed help. You should always check if an organization or group has any minimum requirements before diving in too deep. Don't give up just because the most obvious organization doesn't fit your schedule—chances are another one will.

If you really don't have time to give, you can still help others through passive channels that don't require you to go anywhere or spend lots of time. The most obvious form of this is through monetary donations. If you want to help but don't want to give money, you can also donate supplies or even your own items that you no longer want.

Volunteering has quite a few intangible benefits, including research that suggests it <u>makes</u> <u>you feel like you have more time</u>, and <u>live longer</u>. But it's also a simple way to learn a new skill, or hone the skills you already have. The trick is to find a place you actually like.

Grand Esther, Sister Kim Zook, and husband Keith were escorted by the Paradise of


Faith Grand Family and members of District 15. These beach bunnies had fun

ORIGIN

The real origin of the Eastern Star will always be shrouded in mystery. The origin of the Eastern Star degrees in its initiatory form was from the mind of Dr. Rob Morris. In establishing the Eastern Star, he emphasized the high moral status of Masonry. He knew he could not change the ancient landmarks of Masonry, so he sought some method by which women could share with their Masonic brothers the same inspiration that "prompts man to noble deeds." While this idea was uppermost in his mind for years, it was not until 1850 that he fully developed the Eastern Star degrees in their present initiatory form.

In revising his work at that time, Dr. Morris no doubt had in his own mind thought out carfully the symbolism and significance of the floor plan and corps of officers, for there is much symbolism in all aspects of Eastern Star.
