I needed to learn so many things, but Harold grew up with parents that were members of Eastern Star. I learned that although I am retired, he's working. We used pronouns like us, our, and we. It was never I. There is no I in teamwork.

I have often said that when we first started on this journey that there were five of us in our group and their names were Cindy, Rick, Harold, Fred, and Chris. I find it hard to ask anyone for help. I had to swallow my pride and start asking. Fred Rowe found our music. What a gift he gave us! I needed help with dresses because fashion as you all know is not my thing. With five boxes of sample dresses to look over, I felt like Eliza Doolittle in My Fair Lady. Where do you start when the dresses all look somewhat alike? I asked Chris for help, and she knocked it out of the ballpark!

Chris came to our Deputy Boot Camp. We fixed the Deputies a home cooked meal. As the day of instruction with our deputies continued, I was getting fatigued. I told Chris I was very tired, and she got up and taught them how to bow and turn. Chris helped with passing out the ponies at the baby dedications and those precious red French Trapper hats our Grand Representatives received. I loved seeing Chris put the red hats on the heads of each of the Grand Representatives. My husband contributed to our success before he went home to God. My dear husband wrote me a note that I have on our refrigerator. It says, "God's direction will never take you where his Grace cannot protect you." I see that note and another one he wrote me every single day. Each person in our group contributed to our success.

The truth is that there were more than five of us on this journey. The entire Faith Moves Mountains Grand Family, our Mountaineer Deputies and their guides contributed to our success. I would be remiss if I rambled on through this whole article and skipped my last Focus on Star. I know that many of you enjoyed my history of some of the other characters in the stories of our Heroines. For this issue, I want to explore some more history and talk about the places where these stories take place.

Jeptha lived in Mizpah, which is the Hebrew word for watch-tower. There were several places called Mizpah and one called Mizpeh. The city where Jeptha lived was Mizpah in the region knows as Gilead. Gilead was a mountainous region along the River Jordan which is now part of the Kingdom of Jordan. It is bordered by the kingdom of Ammon, home of the Ammonites. The Mizpah where Jeptha lived was most likely the historical city of Ramoth-Gilead or the Heights of Gilead. It was one of six cities in the region with walls and bronze gates. It is one of several sites proposed to be the actual city of Armageddon, where the battle of the end times is said to start.

Bethlehem was a city in the hill country of the kingdom of Judea. It may be the same city as Ephrath and the place where Rachel died and was buried by the wayside. It was destroyed by Emperor Hadrian and rebuilt by Emperor Constantine and his mother Helena. There is some dispute as to whether or not it was rebuilt on the same site, but there is a cave in the area fitting the description of the manger where Jesus was born. The current city is in the West Bank, near Jerusalem. The valley where Ruth gleaned in the fields and encountered Boaz lies to the east of the city. Bethlehem is the site of King David's anointment and is known as the City of David.

As I noted in my previous article, Ahasuerus was probably the same king as Xerxes I of Persia. He is said to have ruled over one hundred and twenty-seven provinces from India to Nubia. The name of this region was the Achaemenid Empire or the First Persian Empire and he ruled from 486 to 465 BC. It was located in what is now Iran along with the Balkans, Egypt, West Asia, Central Asia and the Indus Valley, over 2 million square miles. At that point in history, it was the largest empire that ever existed. It had an organized system of roads, a postal service, an official language and a large professional army. It would eventually be conquered by Alexander the Great. Throughout most of its history, the empire displayed a large degree of religious tolerance. According to the Book of Ezra, Cyrus the Great released the Jewish people after freeing them from Babylon and allowed them to return to their homeland.

The town of Bethany is located on the Mount of Olives, a few miles from Jerusalem. It has alternately been translated as house-of-dates, house-of-figs and house of the poor. It has existed since the 6th century BC. Some historians suggest that modern day Bethany is not on the same site as the ancient town but instead had migrated from its original location to the nearby area surrounding the tomb of Lazarus. The raising of Lazarus and Martha's meeting with Jesus are the town's most notable events, however it appears in the Bible seven times. The Bible does not specifically mention that Martha and Mary lived in Bethany, but because it is the site of Lazarus tomb, it is assumed that they resided there. In 1138 AD, the Queen of Jerusalem built a large Benedictine abbey near the tomb of Lazarus, dedicated to Martha and Mary. The town was abandoned after the fall of Jerusalem in 1187. The town would eventually be repopulated and is now home to over 20,000 residents.

The Second Epistle of John gives no clue as to where the Elect Lady resided. However, we know that it was in the Roman Empire and can assume that it was during the lifetime of St. John the Evangelist, who's life spans the first century AD. The Romans didn't begin persecuting Christians until AD 64 after Emperor Nero blamed Christians for the great fire of Rome. During this period, Rome spanned all of Europe and parts of Britain, Africa and the Middle East.

Electa's encounter with the Roman soldiers could have occurred anywhere in this area. The story gives us no clue as to where. The fact that she encountered a band of soldiers demanding that she renounce her faith would be more likely to happen close to the heart of the Roman Empire rather than in the outlying territories.

I hope that these little history lessons have helped bring the stories of our beloved Order a little closer to you and will help to better understand the lessons of our Heroines. It has been a real joy writing them and it was an honor to serve as Worthy Grand Patron this year and to have the opportunity to communicate my ideas and feelings to you through the Star-Lite Magazine. I look forward to what the future holds and I hope that the Star in the East will continue to shine on all of my Sisters and Brothers. Farewell and God Bless.

Spencerville Food Bank Program Expanding Outreach to Feed the Hungry

Most recently, in 2022 *Images of Hope Ranch* of Auburn joined the Spencerville OES Food Bank Group.

Through this comprehensive program, the Spencerville Chapter strives to make a meaningful impact in our community on the lives of those facing food insecurity and other challenges. By collaborating with various organizations and providing essential food supplies, the chapter demonstrates its commitment to alleviating hunger and promoting community well-being.
