men who are involved in continuing principles of faith, integrity, and service. Schedules collided through the year and I was not able to get to as many functions as I had hoped. And, unfortunately, the 2020 sessions of these groups were affected by COVID-19 and were not held or were part of a virtual event. While I did speak through video media, I missed the opportunity to meet these young people face-to-face and interact with them on a personal level.

This past Saturday, however, I was blessed with the honor of participating as a judge for the Miss Indiana Job's Daughter and Jr. Miss Indiana Job's Daughter Pageant. Armed with masks and hand sanitizer, we met for lunch with the contestants at noon and followed with interviews with each. In a time in history when it is easy to find fault in many things, I found hope in the attitude and outlook of the contestants. One young lady aspires to go into an engineering field with math classes that would have required me more than fingers and toes to survive. One young lady spoke of becoming a member of law enforcement as she wanted to make a difference and bring hope to her community. Two young ladies have suffered significant loss and have turned grief into inspiration to reach out to others with similar circumstances. Yet another spoke of being a light to those around her in her school. More than one spoke of their faith and involvement in church activities. All of them, at one time or another in interviews or at the program that evening, spoke of how Job's Daughters has given them confidence to be a better person and to do more for the good. (On a side note, many of them belong not only to Job's Daughters, but to Rainbow for Girls as well.). Each of these young ladies told of being shy, backward, introverted when they first began in the Order. They explained that it didn't take long to become confident within the Bethel and then beyond in their lives outside of meetings. Through the memorization of their ritual work, time spent in fellowship with other daughters, and encouragement of mentors, they found excitement and confidence. Their enthusiasm was contagious.

As I reflect on the day's events I am reminded of the enthusiasm we have when we first join the Order of Eastern Star. I thought of how we were eager to learn the lessons and how we wanted to join in on the work and service our chapters provide to our community. We were excited to meet the people that we were told would now walk with us through whatever would come our way. Our Sisters and Brothers reached out to welcome and guide us. I'll go out on a limb and say that many of us can name one or two who influenced us in a very special way.

Today, in the beginnings of meeting together again after pandemic, our Chapters face the challenge of rebuilding. Sisters and Brothers, I put forth the challenge for each of us to remember the enthusiasm we once held for our Order. Perhaps you still hold that enthusiasm, or perhaps it has lost a bit of its fervor in this time apart. I challenge you to remember the excitement of being with family. 

She sent pictures of each dog and each dog wrote a little bit about themselves. Some are quite chatty!

LOUIE - Louie was the first dog given to OES for their generous contribution in June of 2019. WGM Diana Surfus kept his birthname, which was Louie. Please note in the photo I included his vest with the patch of the OES Service Dog project. Each of these sponsored dogs wear this patch on their vest during their two-year training. When a dog graduates, the patch is then given to the client who receives the dog.



"Woofie Woof Woof! This is me, Louie! I am the "King" Eastern Star dog because I was the FIRST dog to be sponsored by this awesome organization! I have done a lot of

traveling around the state meeting so many of you and miss doing so since this human thing called Covid has been messing things up! But I am so handsome and everyone says I look like my half-brother Charlie! I'm going to graduate soon. I was born on July 18, 2018 and just turned two. They call me the Sun dog (but then I was born in July so my horoscope is Cancer!) 'cause I love to lay in the sun for hours and just watch the birds fly over me! I've been working on my barking manners 'cause I like to Woof at things that make noises or when I see new things. I can't help it that I like to talk so much! I am already in my Level 3's where I am learning things that will be specific to a client's needs – like getting their wheelchair, putting a blanket over them when they go to bed, retrieving anything they need like a

phone, a drink from the refrigerator, their remote – you name it! I hope to see all of you soon!! Sending sloppy wet kisses to all of you!!"

CHARGER - "Woof! They call me Charger and I am one handsome golden retriever!



OES District 15 has sponsored me. All of the girls (humans and two legged) fall in love me because I have these adorable eyes that

will melt your heart. I was born on 5/27/19and my birth name was Woyjeck because I was named after a brave fallen forest fire fighter who died in the line of duty. I have a calm and soothing personality compared to these other ICAN dogs. I listen well, love to learn new cues and I LOVE the snow, taking walks, picking up a toy to greet people and I am doing so good in my Level 2 training. I love my handler, Patrick, and credit him for teaching me so many things. I am his 2nd dog so he works really hard and I want to make him proud of me. He told me one time that he has never felt "proud" before and it wasn't until he was sent to prison and became part of the ICAN program, did he feel like he was worth something. I love on him and tell him that we will get through this training together and he will be proud of his accomplishment with me. I am doing everything in my doggone power to make him feel that life is a wonderful thing and dogs only make it better!"

MOOCH – "They call me Mooch and my sister is Lucy. OES District 4 has sponsored



me. We were part of the Game of Thrones litter! I am one of the younger Eastern Star dogs and was born on January 25, 2020 and my birth name was Yara. Due to Covid-19, I have not

been able to start my training inside the men's prison, but I just found out I am going next week! I can't wait to meet my new

handler and I have had so much fun with my puppy raiser, Ana. She is SO SMART and has taught me so many things already – like sit, stay, down, den, watch, and more! I can't wait to go to school and show everyone how much I have learned so far! Being puppy raised by Ana has introduced me to so many experiences – like learning to be around a cat! I have learned to not LOOK at that cat! I just turn my head and move real fast away from him! I have gone to church with her, on walks and even to school because she is in college and studying to work with animals like me! I look forward to meeting all of my Eastern Star friends when I come out on furlough. Waggin' tails, Mooch"



LUCY – "My name is Lucy and OES District 9 & 14 have sponsored me. I was named after Lucille Ball and this really special lady called Lucille!

Some say I have the personality of I Love Lucy and, of course, everyone LOVES me! My birth name was Lyanna. I like to people watch! Sometimes when my pup starter, Lori, takes me on walks I just stop to watch those humans who are running real fast or are on those funny things called skateboards. I also got to be friends with her dog, Millie, who at first was kinda stuffy with me, but now she has warmed up to me. I like to get down on my four legs and stalk her! She then runs around the room and I get to chase her. We have become such good friends! Lori has introduced me to so many things that are important for me to experience as a puppy - door bells, vacuums, drills, sirens, those things called weed trimmers, blenders – you name it! I love being with her and all of my dog friends at the prison – we have gotten so close. I know my day is coming soon when I will graduate and I will miss all of them. But I can't wait to meet my forever human friend that will need my help and provide them so much independence. I will change their life!"



CODY "Ruff, ruff! My name is Cody and I was named after Kodiak bear! OES District 13 has sponsored me. Like my brother Thomas says, we are all part of the Bear Necessities Litter

and he is not as smart as he says he is because he is always chasing cats and I don't chase cats! You just don't mess with a cat and he has yet to learn this! Anyway, all of the furlough volunteers say I am an amazing dog. I love to cuddle and some say I could become a professional lap dog if I wasn't being trained to be a service dog. My last

furlough volunteer, Megan, said that I can talk in my sleep in any position. She even finds me in the back of her car with my head hanging over the seat snoring away! I know my Level 2 skills really well, but she said one thing I have to work on is my floor surfing and wanting to put things in my mouth all of the time! I barked at her and told her it was a dog thing and we love anything on our level! I love to play fetch, play with other dogs and my most favorite is sleeping at my human's feet."

But I gotta say, I have had two of the best teachers like Festus and Nick and I love everything I am learning by my handler, Jerome."


