

ready for this special Session. So much to do and so little time!




As I conclude, as always, my prayer for each of you is for good health and safe travels. May God bless all of you and your families.

My General Grand Experience (by Renee Andrews – PDD #21)

Over 100 Indiana Members started out very early on a crisp October morning for what would be the trip of a lifetime to attend the General Grand Chapter in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. Our route had been greatly changed at the last minute due to Hurricane Helene. The first members climbed on the buses from the Shrine Lodge in Fort Wayne at a time of day most people don't see. We then traveled to Fisher's Masonic Lodge where most of our intrepid travelers boarded the buses. We picked up the rest of our travelers at Jeffersonville Lodge and were on our way. We traveled through West Virginia, and the weather and scenery were beautiful. The trip was long, but we had good company to spend the time with. We arrived at the Marriott Convention Center at around 1:00 a.m. and were met by several other Hoosiers, who had come by alternate means, and our wonderful Chairman for the buses, Sister Diana Surface.

The next morning was an orientation type morning as we picked up our credentials and checked out the vendor area, the hotel itself, and the convention area. Sister Diana had also set up an area in the vendor area for our candidate, Sister Susie Roach, to be able to meet and greet voting delegates from around the world. This booth was very professional looking, but still had Hoosier Hospitality. It was staffed by our Indiana Members, who made sure people knew Indiana was in the house and had a person in the running for the General Grand Line. Sister Diana had also overseen the Hoosier Hospitality Suite, which was quite popular with Indiana members as well as many people from other jurisdictions. The Suite was staffed by volunteers and was open nearly the entire time we were there. We had numerous return visitors after finding out we were a fun group to hang out with. As we mingled with the other attendees, we made sure to show our pride and support for Sister Susie. I personally got to talk to people from most of the Canadian Provinces, Hawaii, South America, and the Philippines. It was wonderful to see no matter where in the world you were from, the Order of the Eastern Star gave us all a common ground to discuss numerous different points of view.

The following days were filled with

attending chapter sessions, visiting local attractions, shopping, and of course, trying out new places to eat. One of the interesting places we visited was Broadway at the Beach, which was a collection of restaurants, small businesses and attractions. One of which was the Sky Wheel, which was a two story Merry-Go-Around. The view from the top was fabulous. Everyone we met was nice and the total vibe was welcoming. I really think I could do the "Snowbird" thing here.

The hotel and its staff did a fantastic job taking care of us. There were a few glitches in staffing, but with the number of people staying, it should have been expected. There were a couple of mobile food stands, which did extraordinary business. One being a sandwich and drink tent, right beside an ice cream truck, that was open every day during the busy noon rush. There was also a smoothie stand that had excellent healthy choices, along with some non-healthy, but really good, oversized muffins. professional There was also a photography company who made the rounds to get photographs of all the activities, even the individual state banquets.

Speaking of the Indiana banquet, we had over 110 people present for this triennium dinner. It is believed this was the largest collection of Indiana members ever. It was a wonderful evening spent with friends.

The day of the election arrived and to say the tension was high would be an understatement. We had several people, me included, running large text circles with people who were not able to be with us. I personally had 15 people to whom I was texting events in real time. The General Grand Chapter does not have electronic voting, so the business session moved a little slower than what we are now doing. Any close votes would have to go to paper ballots, and some Jurisdictions would have persons voting several ballots. The three candidates for

Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress were introduced and the voting ensued. My little text group was pacing the floors back here in Indiana, while I was trying not to jump out of my seat. The first ballot was collected and after what seemed forever (but surprisingly not that long, for the counting of over 1,000 ballots), our own Sister Susie Roach was elected on that first ballot!

There was more business conducted, but as non-voting delegates, most of us moved on to the celebration portion of the evening. The Hospitality Room was awash with numerous people from all over the world, who came to join Indiana in our celebration.

Installation was held on Thursday (Halloween) evening, and our Sister Susie was escorted by a very proud Brother Mike and led by our Grand Marshal, Brother Carl Hinshaw, whom Sister Susie had asked to be her flag bearer and present our Indiana state flag. It was exciting to see the absolute sea of smaller Indiana state flags as our newly elected Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress was introduced and installed.

Then it was time to pack our bags and get back on the bus. The trip home seemed to be twice as long as the trip down, as most trips seem to be. After dropping off members in Jeffersonville and Fishers, the remainder of the crew arrived back at the Fort Wayne Shrine Building at approximately 1:00 a.m.

As for this year, as we continue to celebrate Sister Susie's election, Indiana will be welcoming the Most Worthy Grand Matron and her Corps of Officers to Indiana this June and we will be holding an Honor Night for the RWAGC. Hopefully, we will be able to start things out with a great showing of our

membership. Remember, we will have some amendments this year that are a direct result of resolutions approved by General Grand Chapter. One of those will be the major change to the requirements for membership to the Order. Starting now, new petitions have been created and if you have a female who wants to be a member of the Order, but does not have a Masonic relationship, all they will need is a letter of recommendation from a brother **and** a sister filed with the petition. This is exciting news for our Order, as most of us have at one time or another said, "She would be a great member, but unfortunately she doesn't have a Masonic affiliation."

In review, we had an absolutely fabulous time, and Myrtle Beach welcomed us with great warmth and hospitality. Indiana truly made a lasting impression on the General Grand Chapter world with their numbers, their support, enthusiasm and hospitality. The next three General Grand Chapter Trienniums are being planned with 2027 to be held in Arizona, 2030 to be held in Pennsylvania, and 2033 to be held in Las Vegas, Nevada. I would love to see as many of our Indiana members present as possible for that 2033 General Grand Chapter session, as that will see the installation of our Sister Susie as Most Worthy Grand Matron (AKA the Worthy Matron of the World). Then in 2036, we will be welcoming the Order of the Eastern Star back "Home" to Indiana where General Grand Chapter was first founded. It will be an amazing time (a lot of work) in welcoming the world to Indiana, but I know that Indiana members will step up and be spectacular examples of the meaning of Hoosier Hospitality. Get on board, strap in and prepare for a great ride!!

My friends, may you have the Serenity to accept the things you cannot change, the Courage to change the things you can, and the Wisdom to know the difference.


