I have not missed a Grand Chapter since. I soon, after I was WM of my local Chapter, became an active member of it. But beyond all the stations I've held, the stories of the five Star Points are my favorite. My life relates to them. My membership has given me so many things-good friends; comfort during trying times; and opportunities to visit members around the world. Some say our ship is sinking, if that's true I assure you I'll not give up, I'll be the last one off the ship. I love EASTERN STAR. Outside of my love for God, my family, my love for Eastern Star shines brightly."

As an Order we have a lot of great attributes and yet our numbers are reducing. Perhaps we need to think about why new members attend chapters meetings for a while and then stop attending meetings. Perhaps it's because we don't form that circle and protect our new members like the elephants do. When the investigative committee meets with candidates, we should let them know that if initiated we will teach them what

they need to learn and will be happy to explain what we do and why we do it. We need to do more teaching after they are initiated. We need to teach them how to hold their hands in the reverent attitude, when to turn and face the altar, and why and how we should do the things we do. I was fortunate that the members of New Castle #116 taught me in a gentle way. There was one woman in our chapter who was not as kind or patient. I stopped at Kroger's and bought flowers to give to her at chapter one night. Her attitude towards me changed. She could have been more helpful to me from the beginning of my membership, but she was not. It was Larry and Nancy Frost that taught me why we do things in a certain way. Nancy said, "I know you want to learn it correctly. If you learn it wrong, it's a bad habit." It was her kind way that made me want to get things right. When teaching it is much better to be kind and use encouraging words than negative words. We all learn differently. Diagrams in our ritual are not always easy to read. I learn better by seeing it done correctly and then doing it while someone is there to gently correct my errors. We should tell the new members three things they did correctly before you ever tell them what was incorrect. Use honey not vinegar.

The Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of our chapters should expect all members to protect each other, correct people in a positive and private way, form that circle and stop others from being so negative and cold towards each other. Some members of this order are behaving like the woman who did not help me. I was trying to make friends and trying to fit in when she did very little to help me. Why would a woman or a man want to stay in our order when other people treat them unkindly? Form the circle to keep negative people from driving your new members or those members who are trying to serve in our order from leaving and giving up. Be the leader and say, "That's not how we are going to treat each other." Get closer to them and show the signs again and again until they get it correctly but do it in private.

Finally, be kind to people who have a head injury, have received chemotherapy, or who have suffered a stroke. Support them during their struggle. Their memory is affected and perhaps they can't do the ritualistic work the way they use to do it. We need to be more like the elephants and support them when they struggle with their work.

Well, winter is here. It's a good time to snuggle up by the fire and have a hot beverage. I know that many Chapters are dark and we only have a few things going on with the Grand Chapter. While we enjoy the break in the Grand Chapter business this Winter, I am going to devote a much larger portion of my article to the "Focus on Star" section this month. During my time in OES, I have spent some time researching the background of the Heroines of our Order as well as some of the people that support them in their stories. Here is some more background for them, sourced from the

Bible as well as other historical texts.

Jephthah was the ninth judge of Israel. A Biblical judge was not only a judge in the legal tradition but also a military leader, chosen by God. Jephthah was the son of a harlot and had been expelled from his homeland of Gilead by his brothers because of his illegitimacy. He was a man of great valor and when the Ammonites made war against the Israelites, the elders of Gilead went to fetch Jephthah to lead the campaign against the Ammonites. He agreed to return on the promise that they would make him their Chieftain.

Boaz was a just, learned and pious Judge of Israel. One of the pillars of King Solomon's Temple was named after him. He was a rich landowner and a prince of the people, but he personally oversaw the work of his threshers to prevent any immorality or theft, which were common at the time. He was not in the habit of inquiring after the women working in his fields, but Ruth's grace and chaste conduct in her work induced him to inquire about the stranger. Boaz was a close relative of Naomi's husband, Elimelech. When Ruth went to work in the fields of Boaz, she was not aware that he was a relative of Naomi. After Boaz showed her many kindnesses, she told Naomi about him. Naomi realized that Boaz was her husband's relation and that he was obliged to marry her son's widow. Ruth eventually bore him seven sons including Obed, father of Jesse, father of King David.

Queen Esther was the second queen to King Ahasuerus of Persia. The first queen, Vashti, was deposed after she refused to submit when the king (being in "high spirits") ordered her to appear before him and his guests to display her beauty. King Ahasuerus was most likely King Xerxes I of Persia. Xerxes was the son of Darius I. Under Persia law, the king was required to choose a successor before going on any dangerous expeditions and indeed Darius was killed after a failed campaign to suppress a revolt in Egypt. Xerxes attempted to invade Greece twice during his lifetime, but both times he was forced to retreat. During his reign he built the Gate of all Nations, the Hall of a Hundred Columns and a palace twice the size of his father's. In 465 BC, Xerxes was murdered by Artabanus, the commander of the royal bodyguard.

Lazarus of Bethany, brother to Martha and Mary, is the subject of one of the most famous stories in the bible. As related in the Gospel of John, he was bought back to life by Jesus after being dead for four days. Lazarus' sister Mary was the same Mary who anointed the Lord and wiped his feet with her hair. While Jesus was traveling, he received word that Lazarus was gravely ill. Jesus decided to stay where he was for two more days, stating that Lazarus' sickness was "not unto death." After two days, Jesus set out to return to Judea despite the objections of his disciples. They were concerned that Jesus would be stoned to death if he returned. He told them that they needed to go because Lazarus was asleep. By that Jesus meant the final sleep, but his disciples misunderstood and said that sleep would do him well.

The story of Electa is told in the Second Epistle of John, written by Saint John the Evangelist. John the Evangelist is also the author of the Gospel of John, the first and third Epistles of John and possibly the Book of Revelation. John the Evangelist is also considered to be John the Apostle. The word evangelist means "writer of a gospel" in this context. John is the only Apostle of Jesus who lived into old age and was not killed for his faith although he may have been exiled for it. He is generally considered to be the

"Beloved Disciple" in the Gospel of John. A symbol of St. John is the chalice, due to his association with the Last Supper. There is also a legend where he was handed a cup of poisoned wine, which he blessed and caused the poison to rise out of the cup in the shape of a serpent.

I hope that this has brought you a little more insight into the beautiful stories that we know so well. Our Heroines and the people around them lived in the most amazing times in history and I am always fascinated when I learn something new about their lives. I hope that everyone will have a year of peace and prosperity and I look forward to seeing all of you very soon.

My Father's Masonic Journey By Keely Roe, Miss Indiana Job's Daughter 2023-2024



My name is Keely Roe, and I am your Miss Indiana Job's Daughter for the 2023-2024 term.

I recently interviewed my father, Terrence Roe, 33°, about his involvement with the Masonic Youth organizations of Indiana. My dad is a Past Master of Warsaw Lodge #73, Past Commander-in-Chief of the Fort Wayne Consistory, and an advisor of John Chapman DeMolay Chapter in Warsaw. He is also a member of the Mizpah Shrine and Warsaw Chapter #88, Order of Eastern Star. He was awarded the 2021 Scottish Rite Youth Advisor of the Year and

2023 Adult Youth Leadership Award from the Indiana Grand Council of Cryptic Masons for his involvement with DeMolay and Job's Daughters.



My dad started his Masonic career in 1984 as a charter member of Crimson Shield DeMolay Chapter in Kentucky. As a member, he "enjoyed getting to know people from around the state" at dances, regional meetings, and Conclave. He met many friends and mentors through DeMolay, many of whom he is close with today. DeMolay taught him several life lessons and skills, from learning how to tie a tie to public speaking. His career in DeMolay included a term as a State Officer after serving his chapter as Master Councilor. He was also presented with the Degree of Chevalier.

After being a member in his youth, my dad decided to join Freemasonry. Interestingly, his father was not a member. He really had no connection to Masonry other than DeMolay, but because

"some of the advisors that we had in DeMolay were members of [Lodge]...I wanted to be a part of what they were a part of." He joined Polar Star Lodge #363 in 1990. He transferred to Warsaw Lodge #73 in 2013.

My brother, Griffin, and I are involved in Masonic Youth organizations. I am a member of Job's Daughters Bethel 8 in Fort Wayne, and my brother is a member of John Chapman DeMolay Chapter in Warsaw. The influence to join these organizations came from my father. "I remember what an impact DeMolay had on me," he said. "Having a common bond with other people my age" was very important. Learning how to "speak in public, conduct [yourself] in groups, and collaborative work in meetings" were skills that he wanted us to learn. Masonic Youth organizations were created for that purpose.




The influence of my father's support has given me the confidence and drive to be an active part of Job's Daughters. I'm sure my brother would say the same thing about DeMolay. My dad said that "knowing how to set goals and achieve them has been a real important part" of our Masonic Youth experience. Just like when he was a member, we have learned ritual, traveled around the state, and made connections. "You have been exposed to people I respect as Masons...You have had some exposure to some really good people and have good examples to look up to." On a personal note, being involved in Job's gave me an opportunity to grow closer with my dad. It gave us something to bond over. Our entire household is involved in at least one organization, which has given us something unique and special to enjoy together.

My dad's professional career is in education. With this in mind, he stated that "the youth of today need to learn to work collaboratively. They need to be exposed to the precepts of DeMolay and the ideals of Job's and Rainbow." All three of our organizations strive to teach citizenship, leadership, love and respect for parents, service, spirituality, and many more attributes that are necessary to be a well-rounded citizen. He also stated that the youth of today

should have the opportunity to "get to know the quality of people that are in Freemasonry and the Masonic organizations." "It's good for all the youth to have some connections [to] people who will look out for them, provide examples, and get [them] prepared for what [their] adult lives could be."

We would love for you to invite your children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, neighbors, or any other youth in your life to join one of our three organizations. Even if they are involved in other organizations or activities, the teaching of Masonic Youth is the icing on the cake. We encourage them to get involved even if they can't attend every meeting or event. The lessons and tenets of Freemasonry are important to the welfare of our communities, and it starts with our youth. I encourage you to give your youth the opportunity to join your legacy of Masonry and benefit from our teachings.

In 2019 we started a new reward program to thank our many volunteers. Anyone who works a shift in our donut trailer will be entered into several drawings for five gas cards and a \$25.00 donation to their favorite charity. Also, we will give away four "Donut Make You Smile T-Shirts" and a Ticket Package to an Indianapolis Colts Football Game (OES/Masons Members eligible only). We had 85 entries for the Colts Package. Melissa Amstutz of the Ft. Wayne Chapter won the Indianapolis Colts Football Game Tickets.

The Indianapolis Colts Package included 2 Tickets for:
